New York Land Co. v. Republic of the Philippines, 634 F.Supp. 279, further decision sub nom. Republic of the Philippines v. Ferdinand Marcos, 640 F.Supp. 737 (S.D.N.Y. 1986), aff'd 806 F.2d 344 (2d Cir. 1986). Litigation froze New York area properties of former Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos and Imelda Marcos. Barbara Handschu v. Special Services Division, 605 F.Supp. 1384 (S.D.N.Y. 1985), affd 787 F.2d 828 (2d Cir. 1986), further reported 737 F.Supp. 1289 (S.D.N.Y. 1989). Class action on behalf of all people and organizations engaged in First Amendment political expression in the City of New York. One of four co-counsel who secured decree governing Police Department political surveillance and intelligence collection practices in New York City. Decree modified in light of post-September 11th terrorism developments, 273 F.Supp.2d 327 (S.D.N.Y. 2003) and 288 F.Supp.2d 411 (S.D.N.Y. 2003). Court summarizes its power to enforce political surveillance guidelines, requires police to notify Class counsel when police change applicable regulations 679 F.Supp.2d 488 (S.D.N.Y. 2010). Sanction imposed on police department's attorneys 727 F.Supp.2d 239 (S.D.N.Y. 2010), vacated on consent in conjunction with police withdrawing appeal of relief granted to Class in district court rulings. Ruling finding the injunction specifically requires NYPD to give notice of change in NYPD policy concerning videoing or photographing political demonstrations in New York City 905 F.Supp.2d 555 (S.D.N.Y. 2012). Court asks parties to strengthen proposed revisions to Modified Guidelines proposed in settlement of enforcement motion challenging surveillance of Muslim communities in New York area 219 F.Supp.3d 388 (S.D.N.Y. 2016), court approves Revised Handschu Guidelines 241 F.Supp.3d 433 (S.D.N.Y. 2017). Co-counsel to the Class.

New York Civic Association of the Deaf v. Rudolph Giuliani, 915 F.Supp. 622 (S.D.N.Y. 1996) and 970 F.Supp. 352 (S.D.N.Y. 1997). Class action by deaf and hearing impaired people in the City of New York resulting in permanent injunction preventing removal of fire alarm box emergency notification system from streets of New York under Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Tom Campbell, et al. v. William Jefferson Clinton, 52 F.Supp.2d 34 (D.D.C. 1999), aff'd 203 F.3d 19 (D.C. Cir. 2000), *cert. denied* 531 U.S. 815 (2000). 31 members of the House of Representatives sought a declaratory judgment that the President violated the Constitution and War Powers Resolution by committing U.S. military forces to NATO actions in Kosovo without the authorization of Congress. Dismissed under U.S. Supreme Court's ruling limiting legislative standing. Co-counsel but not a lead counsel.

United States v. Falvey, 540 F.Supp. 1306 (E.D.N.Y. 1982). Challenge to use of evidence obtained through Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) warrants in domestic criminal prosecution of supporters of Irish Republican movement. Co-counsel.
